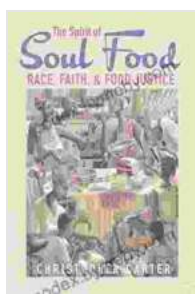

Michael V. Angrosino is Professor of Anthropology at the University of South Florida. He is the author of several books, including *ng Cultural*

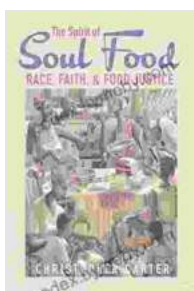
