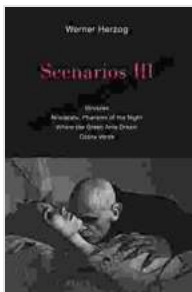

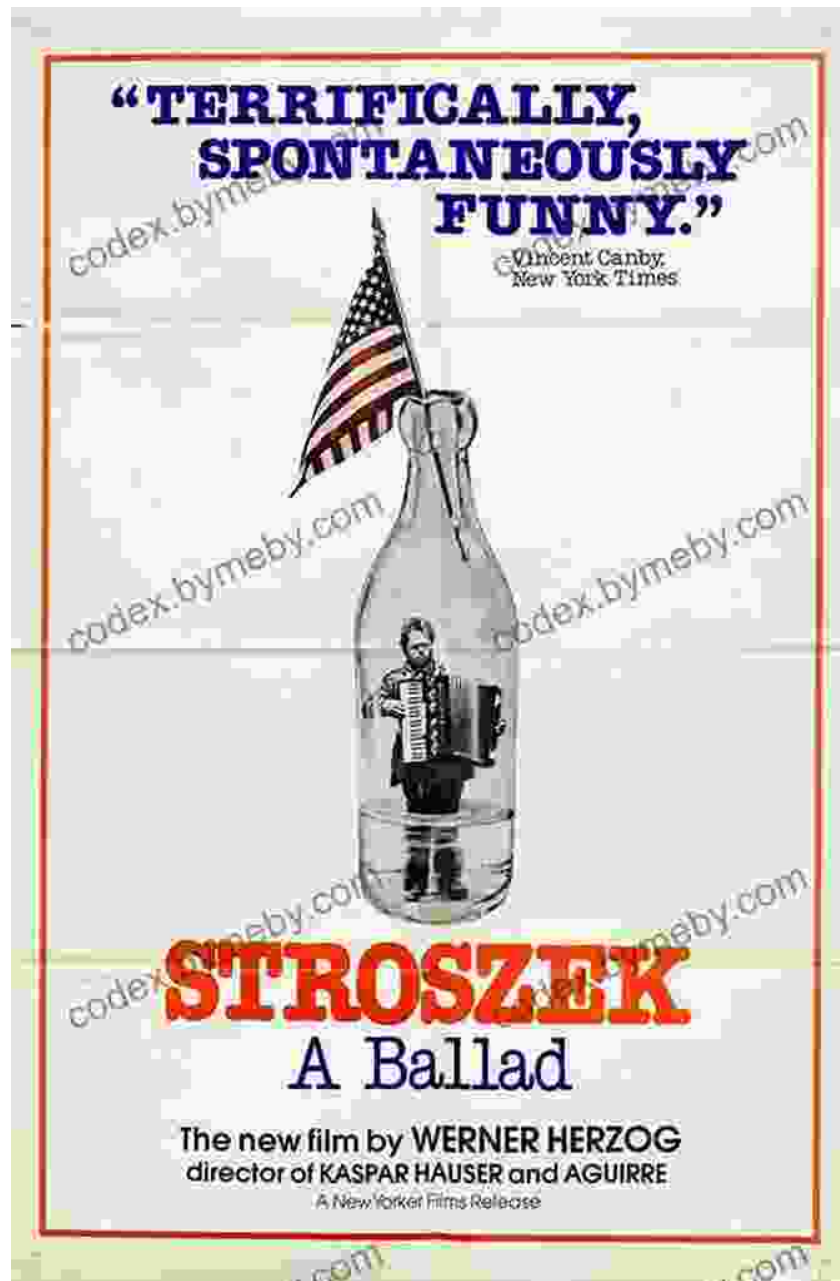

Stroszek (1977)



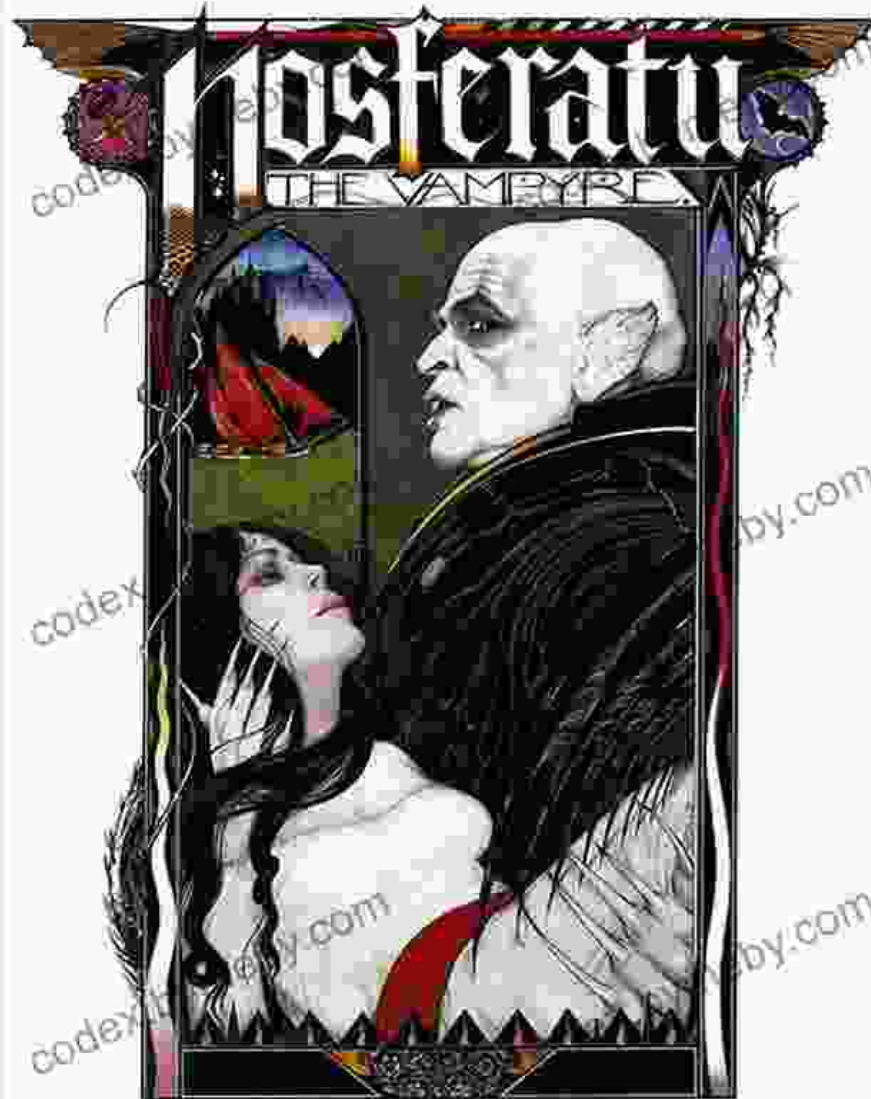
